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**Program Update**

The Equine Assisted Riding Program (EAR) continues growing every month and it's wonderful seeing the progress of our riders. We have seen amazing transformations in our riders who struggle with mental health issues. We have watched children progress in a matter of weeks from looking down with no expression to smiling faces! It's amazing how the change in environment and companionship of a horse can lift an individual's spirit.

The mental health impacts of isolation and COVID have been severe on our youth. The EAR program allows Tara's Chance to serve so many different mental health challenges through horsemanship skills and the companionship of a horse. Our program participants are seeing drastic changes in their level of depression, anxiety, communication skills, mood, and more. Tara's Chance is the perfect peaceful environment that creates the inner peace we all need.

This Fall we have seen record levels of families falling ill and riders missing their therapy at Tara's Chance. While this is challenging for our riders, parents, and team we know that things will continue to improve. Since doubling the number of riders served at Tara's Chance to 68, we still have never canceled a lesson due to inadequate staff or volunteers. That is **RIDING WITH THE STARS** an amazing accomplishment in the equine therapy field and I would like to thank all our amazing staff and volunteers for making that happen. It's been magical to see the organization accompany 68 riders and grow. We are so fortunate to serve so many children who would otherwise still be on our waiting list if it wasn't for you, thank you.

## **Executive Director Update**

On November 1st 2022, Tara's Chance began its new fiscal year and our 11th year as an organization serving our special needs community. To summarize our year in one word, it would be success! We doubled our programs from serving 34 children with special needs weekly to 68, we had the largest fundraising year to date, we expanded our team and our herd, and made significant investments in our future. We continue to grow each month with additional riders in the Equine Assisted Riding Program (EAR) and create new partnerships in our community.



Tara's Chance is excited to partner with community benefit organizations to better serve our special needs community. We are partnering with My Day Counts, No Limits, PRISM, Discovery-Mood & Anxiety Program and other adult day programs to benefit their program participants through equine therapy. The EAR program is based on a progressive skill-building methodology where students work with horses, both on and off the horse, to achieve particular personal goals through horsemanship skills. With these new partnerships we continue growing our mission and improving the level of equine therapy services provided in North Orange County.



## **Philanthropy - Carol Geisbauer**

Carol Geisbauer is well-known in the Southern California nonprofit community through her experience as an Executive Director and grant writer. In 1995, she launched a freelance grant writing practice, developed a three-day grant writing workshop, and taught grant writing throughout Southern California for 15 years. She met our co-founder Tim Howells when he was a student in her grant writing workshop. Carol joined the Tara's Chance Board of Directors in 2019 and has provided strategic planning for the organization since.

Since Carol spent most of her professional career working in the nonprofit sector, giving back to the industry she served is very important to her. She found success in her career raising funds for nonprofits in Orange County and she now feels that it is her turn to be the one making financial contributions to our community. Carol has made Tara's Chance a priority in her philanthropy since learning about the organization. In 2021 she provided the leading gift for Tara's Chance to hire a volunteer manager and has provided scholarships to riders in need. Carol shares, "Giving to a small grassroots organization like Tara's Chance really allows my investment to have a major impact."

Carol's impact and legacy at Tara's Chance will indeed be major because she has named Tara's Chance as a beneficiary of her estate. 

## **New Horse - Sierra**

We are so thankful for the support of the Orange County Chapter Charities and the Fullerton South Rotary Club for purchasing Tara's Chance newest horse, Sierra. At 4-years-old, she is the bright future of our therapeutic riding program. As the youngest horse to ever join our program, she will serve children with special needs at Tara's Chance for over 20 years. Sierra is a 4-year old Gypsy Vanner mare from Newhall, California. She stands at 14 hands tall but her build allows her to handle much heavier riders than horses of that size. Her color is Piebald which means she has splashes of white and black. I would also like to thank the Amigos De Los Niños for sponsoring Sierra to cover the annual cost of her feed, boarding, veterinary, shoeing, and equipment.





## Fun Fact!

Sierra is a Gypsy Vanner, which is a type or breed of domestic horse from the islands Great Britain and Ireland. It is a small, solidly-built horse of cob conformation and is often, but not always, piebald or skewbald; it is particularly associated with Irish Travellers and English Romanichal Travellers of Ireland and Great Britain. From about 1850, travelling people in the British Isles began to use a distinct type of horse to pull their vardos, the caravans in which they had just begun to live and travel. The color and look of the breed were refined in the years after the Second World War. Horses of this type were first exported to the United States in 1996.



## **Rider Spotlight-Jones**

With the exception of sitting up, Jones was late to every physical milestone. We believed his struggle to crawl was due to him being Frank breech during the majority of my pregnancy. We began physical therapy at 8 months but even after he started crawling (at 15 months) it became clear there were other things going on—mainly his complete lack of speech. By the time he turned 18 months, the combination of his lack of words and his inability to stand/walk prompted my pediatrician to suggest early Intervention through the Regional Center.



We were living in LA at the time and at the height of the COVID pandemic. We attended clinic sessions as often as we could but it was difficult to practice those skills outside of our sessions given that we couldn't leave our house. As the world started opening up again, someone suggested equine therapy. I had heard amazing things about it and began researching. I grew up riding horses and loved the idea of this for Jones-plus it was outdoors!



One day I mentioned this search to my older sister and she had said that a friend of hers had had incredible things to say about Tara's Chance. Even though it was in Fullerton, I was willing to make the drive. I signed up, was put up on the waiting list and spent many months hoping for a call. During that time, we had made the decision to move out of LA to Fullerton to be closer to family and get Jones more services through the Orange County Regional Center. About two months after Jones was officially diagnosed with Autism, we got the call! I felt like I had won the lottery.

Jones' particular challenges were lack of speech, low muscle tone and core strength, and trouble with change. He also had a handful of sensory issues, like not being able to wear hats. His first few sessions weren't the most fun for him—there were a lot of tears and a lot of resistance. But each week, I got to see him blossom into a joyful and skillful rider! He tries new things willingly (even if they aren't his favorite) and looks forward to his Tuesday rides more than any other activity.

In the five months that we've been attending Tara's Chance, I have seen more leaps in his development than in any other therapy. It has improved his emotional regulation, his communication, his patience, and his ability to handle changes. The relationship he has with his teachers and his pony, Riley, are more special than any other. It has been nothing short of magical.

Occasionally, we had some stumbles, but in the end, we trusted each other enough to know that it would be okay. Bailey had the soft, gentle coat like a silk blanket, and her warmth encompassed me through my sadness and sorrows. People are shaped by what happens in their lives, and Bailey has built me into the person that I am today. One of the most vital lessons I have learned in life was on the back of Bailey. I learned not to be afraid when I fell out of the saddle, and to find the courage to get back on. I learned to put down walls I built, and allow myself to be my authentic self. Sometimes it seems that the biggest lessons horses teach us have nothing to do with riding. Bailey taught me confidence, leadership and communication. I reached Bailey through not only my tone, but also my body language. I kept my shoulders back, head tall, and an assertive voice to keep her on track. I will always treasure my last day with Bailey. I was the last person to ride her at Tara's Chance. Today, I'd like to say goodbye to my other half. I've not been able to say it even after you passed away.
